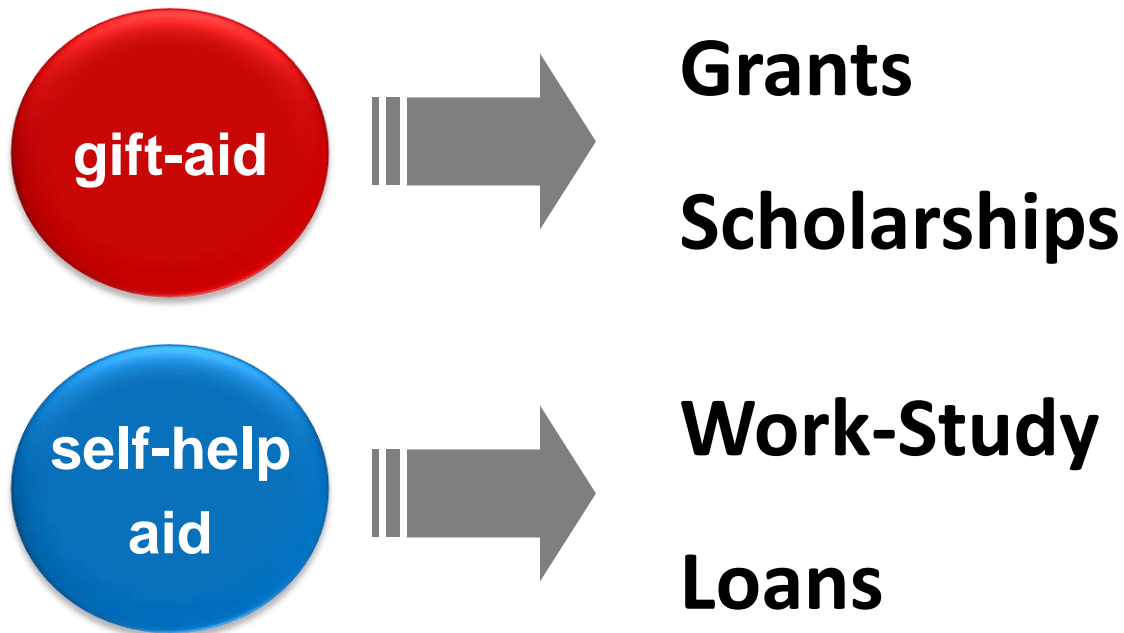

The 411 on Scholarships

- Financial aid applied to expenses associated with attending school (i.e. books and supplies, tuition and fees, miscellaneous living expenses)
- Be sure to follow up with your scholarship organization for concrete rules and details.

Why are Scholarships Important?

2019-20 Average Annual Tuition and Fees in Illinois

- Public 2 year: \$4,766
- Public 4 year: \$13,499
- Private: \$32,595

Framing the Value of Scholarships

- Your time can be worth some BIG money:

*Spend four hours on \$1,000 scholarship application
4 hours of work = \$250 per hour*

- Apply for as many as you can
 - You might be exactly what they are looking for!
 - You might be the only applicant!

Application Elements May Include.....

- General information
 - Demographics
 - Extra-curricular activities; level of involvement
 - Area of intended study
 - Financial need
 - Letters of recommendation
- Academic record (ex: GPA, transcripts)
- Essays/Personal statements
- Additional elements (ex: interviews, auditions, portfolios)

As You Search for Scholarships, Remember...

- Start early
- Apply to as many as possible
- Keep track of deadlines
- Proofread!!
- Submit all required documents
- No amount is too small – this is FREE money!

Finding Scholarships

- College web sites and Financial Aid Offices
- High school web site and school counselor
- Community organizations and churches
- Employer (parent's and student's)
- ISAC's free scholarship search on student portal:

Avoiding Scholarship Scams

- Don't pay money to look for scholarships
- Watch out for the warning signs of a scam:
 - “We'll do all the work for you!”
 - “We guarantee you a scholarship or your money back!”
 - “You can't find this information anywhere!”
 - “You're a scholarship finalist!” But you never applied . . .
- If you encounter a scam, let your counselor and others know.

FAFSA's Role In Scholarships

- First step in applying for financial aid
- Takes about 30 minutes to complete
- FREE at www.FAFSA.gov
- Required for some scholarships – make sure you check scholarship requirements

What Can I Do Now?

- Create a college planning calendar
- Begin looking for scholarships
 - Remember, nothing is too big or too small to be considered!
- Go on college tours/visits (consider virtual tours)
- Ask questions
- Check in with your school counselor
