Spotlight

AHML Officially Certified as a Family Place Library

Members of the Family Place Libraries (FPL) initiative completed their site visit to confirm that the library meets all aspects of the initiative's seven core components. Since staff attended a multi-day FPL Training Institute in October 2018, they've worked to transform the library into a welcoming, developmentally appropriate early

learning environment for very young children, their parents and caregivers. This included the addition of a five-week parent child workshop held twice annually, a parent collection adjacent to areas designed for our youngest customers and a focus on specially designed spaces for interactive early learning. AHML was presented with a Family Place Libraries banner in December, designating the library's certification.



Community Members Participate in Tiny Art Show



More than 200 community members of all ages received 4x4" canvases in November and more than 150 returned finished art pieces for display in the library's display cases. Artists used many different mediums to create a big impact with limited space. Paint, fabric, collage and even sticks and leaves were used in pieces that explored the community's favorite things, places and inspirations.

The Tiny Art Show continues to be a way to celebrate Arlington Heights' creativity and is a delightful surprise to customers. Emily, Programs & Exhibits Specialist, coordinated the program with Eunice, Info Services Advisor, Michele, Info Services Assistant, and Kate, Makerplace Specialist, collaborating to distribute art kits, with the lively design by Colleen, Graphic Designer, brought the final polish that made the show pop.









Makerplace: Year in Review Snapshot

More than 18,000 people visited the Makerplace in 2024, which is a 15% increase from 2023. The Makerplace staff increased program sessions by 15.5% and saw a 16% increase in program attendance. Likewise, there's been an increase in volunteer hours by 16.2% to support these initiatives.

Culinary programming made impressive strides in 2024, notably seeing increases in the number of programs designed by Chef Brian and a wider variety of classes for kids, tweens and teens, including the popular summer Lemonade Pop-ups, plus new ESL culinary experiences. Chef-delivered classes for adults continue to connect community members and build skills through hands-on instruction from culinary experts across a variety of specialty areas. Some innovative additions in 2024 included popular Blue Zones classes and a successful Arlington Heights Chopped! competition (with more of both coming in 2025).

In 2024, 117 culinary classes were hosted in the Makerplace Kitchen, up from 95 in 2023 and 74 in 2022. The busiest months were March with 14 programs, followed by June (13), February (12) and December (11). Demand continues to be measured through wait lists, the highest numbers in February (581) and December (458). The average monthly attendance was 141 customers.



AHML Continues to Build Upon Partnerships

Rolling Green Country Club

AHML was thanked in the acknowledgements of the publication 100 Years of the Rolling Green Country Club, due to Genealogy & Local History Librarian Eddie Kristan's assistance with research and access to archival materials for the process. In a letter of thanks to Eddie, they wrote, "We are proud of the finished product and recognize it was not possible without the wonderful help of many people, like you, who graciously lent a helping hand."



Mount Prospect Library

Info Advisors partnered with the Mount Prospect Library to host a Favorite Things: Best of 2024 on Zoom which had 67 attendees. Four Info Advisors and two Mount Prospect Library advisors shared their favorite books of 2024. The discussion was very organic and flowed nicely with each presenter sharing five titles.

Journeys | The Road Home

Neal, Programs & Exhibits Specialist, and Catalina, Community Engagement Liaison, facilitated the final PADS Meal Prep session of the year (but not the season!). It was another great success, with 10 participants preparing lunch and dinner for 45 individuals at Journeys. In total this year, AHML coordinated six Meal Prep sessions in the Makerplace Kitchen, engaging 79 attendees, volunteering their time to assist their community. In total, more than 400 individual meals were prepared and delivered through this year's program.

Program Attendance Increase During Inclusion Awareness Month

Inclusion Awareness Month (October) featured 12 programs for both adults and youth with total attendance of 315, a 91% increase over 2022. Some of the programs included Active Sensory Fun, Developmental Playgroup, an Assistive Tools Kit Demo, Accessible Kitchen Tech and a Monster Mash Costume Party. More than 30 people attended the Monster Mash Costume Party in the Hendrickson Room.





Writer's Ink Program Thrives on Zoom

The Writer's Ink program has maintained a strong group of regulars on Zoom thanks to the consistent relationship building by Neal, Programs & Exhibits Specialist. Last month's session had 13 attendees, who workshopped six diverse pieces from fantasy and memoir to espionage and poetry. One long-time attendee shared exciting news with the group—with their help, she has just published her first novel! She shared a personal note of thanks and a copy for AHML with Neal:

As a co-founding library, Programs & Exhibits Manager Jennifer Czajka has continued work on the ILP Steering Committee and has been working on this transition with ILA staff since summer 2024. Eighty customers attended a dramatization of Constanze Mozart's life with Wolfgang Amadeus, performed by Jenny Riddle and accompanied by classical pianist Jeffrey Panko. Customers were impressed with the program's artists and enjoyed the "merging of story and music with a beautiful costume and piano accompaniment."





Louise Penny Party

Louise Penny fans gathered for a fun night celebrating the newest release of the series. The program included a presentation about the beloved series and then attendees played a creative locked room mystery game created by Info Services Advisors. Attendees also completed a craft and had snacks while meeting other avid readers.

Music in the Stacks

Neal, Programs & Exhibits Specialist, continued the Music in the Stacks series with another weekend performance on the library's first floor. Cellist Lilianna Wosko returned to perform and drew a diverse crowd of more than 70 while she performed a mix of jazz and classical pieces with some holiday classics mixed in to set the perfect tone for a December Sunday.

Winter Wonders

Preschoolers enjoyed exploring several winter-themed sensory activities, including ice painting, winter seed inspection, freeing animals frozen in ice and more.












Paint a Recipe Box

Emily, Programs & Exhibits Specialist, welcomed 19 artists who took a simple wooden box and turned it into their own individual art piece, and all with a \$0 budget. The program utilized only materials left over from past programs.

Sunday Musicale

Jay, Programs & Exhibits Assistant, welcomed 56 attendees for the final Sunday Musicale of the year featuring vocalist Keri Johnsrud and pianist Kevin Bales performing songs from their album *Beyond the Neighborhood: The Music of Fred Rogers.* In 2024, Sunday Musicale welcomed a total of 1,630 music lovers over 12 diverse performances—the highest attendance in 10 years! More Than 160 Tote Bags for Babies Distributed in 2024

In 2024, Youth Services distributed more than 160 tote bags for new baby cardholder signups. Funded by the Friends of the Library, these bags are stocked with a new book that encourages bonding between caregivers and their children, as well as an early literacy calendar offering fun and accessible ideas for growing children's skills every day of the year. The library currently provides 918 library cards to children under the age of 5! The baby library cards themselves, complete with charming art designed in-house, further communicate the value of books and libraries even to the youngest members of our community.



New Online Resource for Kids



ELL Students Visit the Hub

Youth and Community & Circulation Services staff hosted two classes of English Language Learners (ELL) from Buffalo Grove High School (BGHS). Amy, Youth Outreach Specialist, worked with the BGHS librarian to distribute translated library card applications to Arlington Heights residents ahead of the visit. Catalina, Community Engagement Liaison, led a Spanish-language tour of the library for the Spanish-speaking students. In addition to a services overview and library tours, ELL students had time to explore the Hub and take advantage of the teen offerings at the library.



Good Books, New Friends

Info Advisors collaborated with ESL staff to host a cross-over book discussion called Good Books, New Friends. This discussion was targeted to ESL students and native English speakers to meet and discuss a book together. Ten attendees enjoyed discussing *Kamogawa Food Detectives*. The following day, some of the same attendees (plus many new attendees) made one of the recipes featured in the book at the Makerplace Kitchen. The program was a great success and for several of the participants it was their first time in the Makerplace.

ESL & Literacy Programs

In December, ESL & Literacy staff hosted 33 programs with 364 people in attendance before shuttering the office for winter break.

Holiday Gifts

Last month, customers were actively engaged in customizing gifts at the Makerplace. Inspired by the December newsletter's feature on easy gift-making ideas, nearly 140 mugs were sold for onsite design and customization. Unique projects supported through one-on-one appointments included completing a vintage Christmas stocking with a tricky sewing pattern, etching designs on wood ornaments, and personalizing a leather wallet and wooden photo album, all leading to happy outcomes.





Cookiefest

Chef Brian continued to explore different hands-on programming models for the Makerplace Kitchen, piloting Cookiefest for the holidays. He hosted three 90-minute sessions where registered customers could bring their ingredients and helpers to use the kitchen's equipment and ovens to mass-produce cookies. There was also a station for decorating cookie boxes while the treats cooled. This model has piqued everyone's interest, and Chef Brian looks forward to evolving this approach in 2025.

Culinary Programs

December saw culinary attendees enjoying winter favorites in four culinary classes planned by the Programs & Exhibits Department including two sessions on making homemade cinnamon rolls with 24 attendees and two sessions on making gourmet hot chocolate with Chef Grace with 24 attendees.



Last month, 22 attendees donated blood at the library's Community Blood Drive. In 2024, AHML partnered with Versiti Blood and held five blood drives that collected 135 units that helped save 405 lives in our community!






