Drawn to the Library: Contest Celebrates Youth Artists

The library celebrated National Library Week last month by revealing the winners for the first-ever Love Your Library Bookmark Contest. Five winners were selected from more than 200 submissions received by local youth artists from School Districts 25 and 214. The winners were invited to the library's April Committee of the Whole meeting where Library Board President Amy Somary presented each winner with a certificate and printed copies of their winning bookmark.

"It was really fun for my daughter to enter and see her artwork displayed at the library and think about what she loves about reading and why she loves it," said Cherié Kientoff, whose daughter Selah was selected as one of the winners. "This combined two things she loves, reading and art."

The winners of this contest were selected in five categories that were determined by grade. A panel of judges evaluated the designs and identifying information such as student name and school was withheld during judging. All the submissions were on display on the first floor in April and customers could to pick up a printed winning bookmark to take home. Bookmarks are still available at the Checkout Desk while supplies last.












Illinois Libraries Present Attracts Largest Statewide Audience This Season

Staff Give Back Through Community Meal Prep

In collaboration with the Dunton Street Social Club, a group of library staff who plan social activities to engage library staff, Community Engagement Liaison Catalina and Programs & Exhibits Specialist Neal co-hosted the first all-staff PADS Meal Prep event. Fourteen staff members volunteered their time to prepare meals for the PADS site at First Presbyterian Church, building community and camaraderie while supporting a vital local service.

The committee worked together for several months and was comprised of five area librarians. The three programs were: Planning for Retirement, Navigating Student Loans and Terry Savage Talks Money.

AHML Engages the Community Through Programs & Experiences at the Library

- Arlington Heights resident Sunny Amirpour led 23 adults in learning about toxins and hidden dangers in household cleaners and materials, after which they each made their own environmentally friendly cleaners in glass bottles. Sunny is also one of 24 influencers selected to be featured in the year-long local influencers book display on the first floor.
- Programs & Exhibits Specialist Neal welcomed back Clarence Goodman for The Glorious Arts: Chicago as a Fine Arts Mecca. This engaging program offered 31 lovers of art and architecture a fresh and compelling look at Chicago's often overlooked role in the fine arts world.
- To mark the International Day of Multilateralism and Diplomacy for Peace, Senior & Accessible Services Advisor Jessica hosted a special session of the weekly Current Events group where 32 attendees engaged in a lively discussion on diplomacy's role globally and locally. Participants emphasized the value of the weekly program as an opportunity for in-person dialogue to share ideas, build understanding and find common ground despite differences.

Annual Seed Swap

The annual Seed Swap marks the beginning of a season of monthly swaps outside the Dunton entrance. Over 65 swappers attended, alongside the library's master gardener, John, who was available to share information and answer gardening questions.

Successful Tax Services Season Wraps Up

American Association of Retired Persons (AARP) volunteers completed 668 tax preparations this year from February 3–April 14 which is a 15% increase over 2024 appointments and the highest number since the library started offering the service.

Between January–April the Tax Information page on the library's website received 2,896 views. The tax table on the first floor was up from January 28–April 19. During that time, staff distributed 6,682 federal tax and state tax forms in addition to forms printed by Info Services staff for customers. The self-print station was available from January 28–April 19, where customers printed about 4,500 sheets.

Craft Swap

Makerspace Specialist Lisa coordinated the Makerplace's fourth annual Craft Swap. Over two weeks, Lisa and the Makerplace volunteers collected approximately 237 cubic feet of donated craft supplies including fabric, yarn, jewelry supplies and sewing patterns. Over 130 residents donated, granting them early access to the swap 30 minutes before it opened to the public.

This free event connected Makerplace customers with free arts and crafts supplies and prevented these supplies from ending up in a landfill. Over 70 attendees took advantage of early entry and over 120 attendees participated in the swap. Leftover supplies were donated to Greener Good and Goodwill in Arlington Heights.

Sensory Play

Eighty-five customers celebrated Earth Day by exploring fun sensory activities, including mud painting, flower soup and homemade playdough with nature stampers.



Climate Cafe

Similar to the library's long-running Death Cafe, Climate Cafes offer an opportunity to speak openly about climate anxiety—a topic that can be heavy and emotional. Five attended the discussion, all of whom reported they were so grateful for the space and camaraderie, agreeing they had "found their people." The program was facilitated by Marilee Feldman of Life Counseling with Programs & Exhibits Manager Jennifer Czajka.

Makerplace Fosters Community Connection & Inspires Creativity Through Experiences

• The Makerplace is supporting community engagement through various activities. A local quilting group began meeting at the Makerplace after Joann's closure, where members learned about the free motion quilting machine and other resources. Additionally, Makerspace Specialist Kate developed an Intro to Crochet class in response to high community demand, with 10 attendees and a waitlist of over 40. These



initiatives support hands-on experiences and tailored programs for the community.

- Chef Brian hosted his new Biscuits and Gravy class where participants learned to make this American breakfast classic from scratch while picking up general cooking techniques. The recurring Knife Skills class focused on proper knife handling, cutting various produce and knife care. During the Talk & Taste program, Chef Brian demonstrated how to make and peel hard-boiled eggs easily and how to dye them using natural kitchen items.
- Digital Services & Makerplace Advisor Beth led the Design It, Make It series which is a Digital Services class designed to bridge the services

between the main library and the Makerplace. Attendees created a design in the Tech Learning classroom on April 23 and then met up at the Makerplace on April 30 to learn how to sublimate the design on to a mug. Customers had **"fun designing a mug and learning about using Canva and appreciated having the "hands on ability to create mug after overview of process with support from instructor"**.
