# Twelfth Annual One Book, One Village Concludes with At-Capacity Author Event

About 350 people filled Forest View Educational Center's theatre on October 28 to hear bestselling author Fiona Davis discuss her novel *The Stolen Queen*, while another 62 viewers watched the event live on the library's YouTube channel. Davis discussed a range of topics with Chicago-based writer and editor, Alison Cuddy, the moderator for the evening.

Davis and Cuddy delved into key themes of the novel, such as female friendship and the portrayal of womanhood. Davis explained her decision to write about a 60-year-old protagonist, noting how older women are often underrepresented as heroines in literature. She also reflected on the broader issue of women's stories being overlooked in history.

The Stolen Queen was announced as the book for One Book, One Village (OBOV) 2025 at the end of August and since then copies of the book circulated more than 1,600 times. More than 1,300 people attended book discussions and related programming—including the library's after-hours event inspired by the Met Gala—and staff promoted OBOV to more than 1,200 people at outreach events.

"This has been remarkable, and watching it through social media and all the activities and the gala. I am absolutely blown away, and I'm very grateful," said Davis.

Davis and Cuddy's conversation was followed by an audience Q&A and a book signing. A video recording of the entire interview and event is available for viewing on the library's YouTube channel. Special thanks to the Friends of the Library for supporting this author event.

Youth Services Outreach Specialist Amy and Teen Librarian Alejandria hosted middle school and high school librarians at the library. The meeting was hosted in the Hub so the librarians who serve teens could see the space and encourage their students to visit.



#### **District 214**

Youth Services staff attended three local high school football games this fall, building upon a strong partnership with the school district. Staff engaged 1,351 people of all ages, some familiar faces from the library's monthly Tinker Day visits and many new faces as well. Kids and teens were excited to spin the wheel for a chance to win one of the exclusive library-branded mini footballs.

Back at the library, a small group of Spanish-speaking ESL students from the District 214 Adult Education Women & Children's Center toured the library. They appreciated the personalized Spanish-language tour and were excited to learn about their access to the library's ESL and technology classes.



#### **Local Library Collaboration**

In collaboration with Indian Trails Public Library District, Community Consolidated School District 21 added public library card registration to their enrollment process which resulted in the library connecting 260 students with library cards.

# Library Raises Awareness During Digital Inclusion Week

Digital Services collaborated with Community & Circulation Services to launch the library's participation in Digital Inclusion Week to raise awareness of digital access and equity. Technology Instruction Coordinator David organized and participated in six events including offering tech help with Digital Media Specialist Chris at two bookmobile stops, participating with English as a Second Language (ESL) & Literacy Coordinator Tracy in group discussions with Culture & Conversation attendees on the topic of technology in everyday life and engaging with over 370 people at the Farmers Market with Digital Services Manager Diane, Community Engagement Supervisor Catalina and ESL Advisor Amy.

# **Library Celebrates Inclusion Awareness Month**

Throughout October, the library celebrated its eighth annual Inclusion Awareness Month, highlighting a commitment to inclusive programs and services and fostering dialogue with the community and its partner organizations.

Nearly 200 participants took part in seven featured programs designed for both adults and youth. The celebration kicked off with a Monster Mash Costume Party hosted with community partner Northwest Special Recreation Association at Conyers Learning Center. Other events included the Our Time Celebration, Our Time: Developmental Playgroup, Social Worker in the Library, The Chicago Lighthouse Low Vision Products Road Show, Resource Hour: Clearbrook, and Healthy Living for Your Brain & Body. Staff across multiple departments plan, implement and collaborate to present the featured programming and booklist recommendations, including staff from Info Services, Senior & Accessible Services and Youth Services.





# Library Offers Halloween-Themed Programs for Youth

#### Halloween Fun

Dinosaurs, witches and skeletons invaded Kids' World for the library's annual Halloween Fun, a morning and afternoon carnival of crafts, games and only-slightly-spooky experiences for kids of all ages. Rather than candy or toys, each participant received a Halloween-themed prize book, sure to offer a little more nutritional value for kids. A total of 611 babies, kids and their grownups attended, many sharing positive feedback through words and smiles.



Tween Librarian Kerry and Youth Services Advisor Nicole presented two sessions of a Halloween Candy culinary program. Tweens and teens learned how to make gummy bears and filled chocolate pumpkins. One teen participant who was initially hesitant to attend proudly showed his mom his candy creations. His mom mentioned that trying new foods was outside his comfort zone, so trying white chocolate during the program was a big accomplishment for him.

# Library Hosts Successful Virtual & Off-Site Programs During Construction

#### **Virtual**

Over 70 people joined Programs & Exhibits Coordinator Nikki in welcoming Egyptologist Colleen Darnell for a very high interest program titled Fashion and Beauty in the Age of Cleopatra. Colleen condensed her normal three-hour course on the topic to a one hour-long program specifically for the One Book, One Village audience. Programs & Exhibits Specialist Neal hosted Dr. Foy Scalf from the University of Chicago for The Mummy as Monster: Unraveling a Pop Culture Icon. Fifty-five attendees enjoyed a fascinating exploration of the mummy myth—from early Western encounters with ancient Egypt to its evolution through literature and film.

## **Makerplace**

For the first time, the Makerplace and Genealogy teams joined forces to offer a fun, new program. Genealogy & Local History Librarian Eddie taught customers about the history of family crests and heraldry and showed them how to make their own crests filled with personal meaning. Makerspace Specialist Kate then taught customers how to etch their crests onto slate coasters on the laser engraver. Customers were excited to attend a program at the Makerplace, especially since some had never been before!

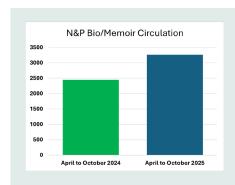


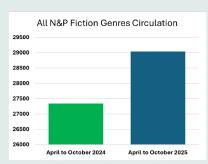


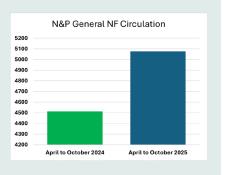
## **KPop Demon Hunters**

## **Increase in Checkouts Following Space Redesign**







In April 2025, Collection Services staff completed a refresh of the New & Popular area on the first floor. More space was added to popular collections like Fiction, Mystery and Biography/Memoir. As a result, checkouts increased by 6% for the Fiction genres, 12% for general Nonfiction and 34% for Biography/Memoir!



# **Library Responds to Social & Economic Needs**

- Programs & Exhibits Specialist Neal, Community Engagement Supervisor Catalina and Chef Brian launched another PADS season with a community cooking program, preparing dinner and dessert for 50 guests at the First Presbyterian Church shelter. Now in its third year, the library's partnership with JOURNEYS | The Road Home and PADS continues to raise awareness and combat food insecurity in the community.
- Info Services Librarians created a list of local food resources for the library's website during the SNAP interruption that took effect on November 1. This resource list shares ways in which community members can receive help and/or volunteer to help others in need.
- In October, the English as a Second Language (ESL) & Literacy team hosted 56 programs for adult English language learners, and 611 people participated in total for these classes.
- To help adult English language learners apply real-world communication skills, ESL & Literacy Coordinator Tracy led two student groups to a local café, where they practiced reading menus, ordering food and conversing in English. For many, it was their first 'brunch' experience, and the response was overwhelmingly positive.



# Makerplace Fosters Community Connection & Inspires Creativity Through Experiences



### One Book, One Village

The Makerplace joined the One Book, One Village celebration with themed programs including Laser Etch a Cartouche, Sculpt Your Own Egyptian Hippopotamus and Beyond the Book where attendees made grape stuffed leaves with Chef Brian before discussing the book.











### In the Makerplace Kitchen

Chef Brian celebrated fall flavors in the kitchen with new classes on apple cider donuts and heart-healthy soups, and an apple tasting during October's Talk & Taste.

## **Fiber Arts Meetup**

This month's Fiber Arts Meetup drew the largest crowd ever to a Makerplace meetup. Fourteen customers joined Makerspace Specialist Kate to work on their own projects ranging from Halloween cross stitch and a crocheted scarf for a Halloween costume to wintry embroidery and knit sweaters. Customers continue to find great community at these meetups and love sharing their projects and asking for advice from fellow attendees.

### **Inspired By Art**

Inspired by a session at the Illinois Library Association's Reaching Forward Conference, Digital Services & Makerspace Advisor Beth created a weaving project for October's Inspired By Art Afternoon and Night programs. Beth collaborated with Digital Services & Makerspace Advisor Michael to design and produce a wooden loom for each customer using the Makerplace's Epilog laser cutter. Weaving classes have traditionally been challenging at the Makerplace because customers' projects "live" on the loom until completion. By providing individual looms, customers were able to work at their own pace and create textiles using yarn without time constraints.

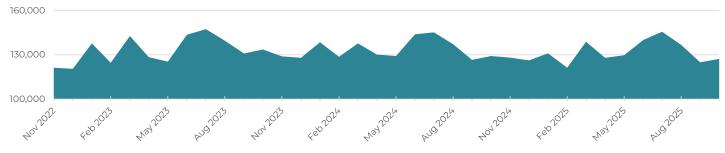

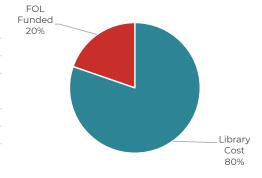
